

Vikersundbakken

Vikersundbakken or Vikersund Ski jump
(https://vikersund.no/) is a ski flying hill at
Vikersund in Modum, Norway. It is one of the two
largest purpose-built ski flying hills in the world
Nine world records have been set there,
including the current record of 253.5 meters, set
by Stefan Kraft. The complex consists of a large
hill, a normal hill and several training hills.

The hill was opened in 1936 as a large hill.

Vikersundbakken was the first ski flying hill to receive floodlights in 2006. It has hosted the FIS Ski Flying World Championships in 1977, 1990, 2000, 2012 and 2022

Blaafarveværket

The Royal Cobalt Works has a long history and was established as early as 1776. For over 100 years, thousands of people worked to extract cobalt from the deep mines at Modum. This special metal was used to make cobalt blue paint - which in turn was supplied to the entire world's porcelain and glass industry. In fact, between 1773 and 1893, Norwegian cobalt extraction accounted for as much as 80 % of the world's production!






Holmenkollen Ski Arena

any other region in Norway.


